

## *Historical Summary*

- 1850-1855 . . . . Coming of Welsh families to Newburg area.
- 1853 . . . . . Rolling Mill established by David I. Jones and his brother, John Jones. This mill developed into American Steel & Wire Co.
- 1857 . . . . . Thomas D. Jones and George M. Jones, lately from Wales to Niles, Ohio, arrived in Newburgh, and started a Sunday School with 13 pupils, in home of Robert Edwards: George M. Jones, superintendent, Thos. D. Jones, songleader. Cottage prayer meetings began.
- 1858 . . . . . Interest in having a church led to its organization at the home of William Jones on Harvard St., with fifteen charter members, as follows in the order of their coming:

- 1860 . . . . . Erection of first church building on Wales St. Rapid growth of membership and church influence.
- 1858-1864 . . . . George M. Jones, one of the first deacons, not then ordained, served as spiritual leader, assisted in the pulpit by many visiting ministers.
- 1864 . . . . . Church calls William Watkins, just graduated from Marietta College, southern Ohio. He was ordained at Wales St. Church, July 3, 1864.
- 1876 . . . . . Dedication of present building on Jones Rd.
- 1886 . . . . . Rev. W. P. Edwards, pastor of the church for seven years, passed away suddenly. The church erected a monument in Harvard Grove Cemetery in his memory, and placed marble slab on church wall in recognition of his life and work.
- 1901 . . . . . Dedication of memorial windows.
- 1909 . . . . . Unveiling of portrait of Thomas D. Jones, deacon 1858-1909.
- 1913 . . . . . Building of Annex, adding two rooms to church.
- 1928 . . . . . Installation of Lyon & Healy Pipe Organ.
- 1958 . . . . . Purchase of Baldwin Electronic Organ.





## *Brief History of the Jones Road Congregational Church*

From 1850 to 1855 the records of old Newburgh take note of the coming of Welsh families into the area. Among these were two brothers, David I. Jones and John Jones. Being men of vision and courage, they set about establishing the American Rolling Mill Co. in 1853, which later developed into the American Steel & Wire Co.

Welsh laborers were recruited for the work in the mills. Bringing with them the rich religious heritage of their native country they were at once concerned to continue the culture of their faith. Accordingly, they would gather together in their homes to sing the Welsh hymns, and hold prayer meetings.

These interests were given impetus with the arrival of Thomas D. Jones and George M. Jones, who had shortly come from Wales to Niles, Ohio, and were making their home in Newburgh. These men were leaders in starting a Sunday School in 1857 in the home of Robert Edwards on Broadway with thirteen pupils enrolled. George M. Jones acted as Superintendent and Thomas D. Jones led the singing.

It is felt that the dynamic behind this initial religious effort was the cottage prayer meetings which were deepening in their interest and power. Like the Pilgrims of Plymouth these devout souls were concerned to have a church, and so it came about that in 1858 in the home of William Jones on Harvard St. a Welsh Congregational Church was started with fifteen charter members. The Rev. D. Davies (Dewi Emlyn) acted as Moderator, and George M. Jones as scribe. Thomas D. Jones and William Jones were elected the first deacons, and George M. Jones as the first secretary of the new organization. It was unanimously decided to follow the polity of the Congregational Churches. Meetings were held for about two years in the home of Deacon Thomas D. Jones. With more Welsh

people coming to the area and with church interest growing, larger quarters were beginning to be necessary. Sensing this Esquire Hamilton, father of Judge Hamilton, offered a lot on Wales St. where a structure was built and occupied in June 1860, although it had neither door nor window. However, by September 1860 the building was completed and dedicated. This edifice continued to be the church's home until the erection of the present structure in 1876.

During these first six years, Deacon George M. Jones had charge of the services and did much of the preaching, although not ordained until 1863 at Ironton, Ohio. However, many visiting ministers assisted in conducting services, among whom was Rev. R. Richards.

In 1864 a call was extended to William Watkins, who had graduated from Marietta College in Ohio. He accepted the call and ordination services were held in the church in July 1864. Church interest increased, so that in 1866 it was necessary to build an addition to the Wales St. edifice. Two other ministers served the church until the coming of the Rev. John Jones under whose pastorate the church structure on Jones Ave., later called Jones Rd., was built in 1876. Because it was dedicated on the hundredth anniversary of the Declaration of Independence of our country it was called Centennial Welsh Congregational Church, which is the name cut on the stone tablet on the front of the building at the peak of the cornice of the roof.

The contractor for the construction of the church edifice at 8000 Jones Rd. was Deacon Samuel Evans, the father of Mrs. Evan Mathews, whose grandfather made the pews. The contract was for \$8,700, for which the members had raised \$1,200. The church gratefully remembers that David I. Jones and John J. Jones came forward to pay the balance, so that the building was dedicated free of debt.

Another item of special interest to every worshipper is the fact that the church has always been free from the echo which has harassed some of the largest structures. This problem was solved through the suggestion of one William Hughes,

a mason from Wales, who gave the suggestion that a dead air space be left between the inside and outside walls. This was followed and as a result the church has excellent acoustics.

Following the Civil War the church shared with the community many difficulties, but notwithstanding them the membership grew and the influence expanded in the religious and social life of the area. Indeed, "it had come to the kingdom for such a time as this."

It is worthy of note and reflection that during this span of fifty years the prayer meeting was a major and vital part of the church's life. The sessions were held on Monday evening, following a full Sunday schedule. And it is said there were scarcely ever any empty seats. Sometimes these meetings would continue for even two weeks. So many of the members were prepared and capable that it was not necessary during even two weeks to call twice on the same person to lead in prayer. With spiritual power thus generated one can understand why this period was one of heartening growth and helpfulness.

One pastor, the Rev. W. P. Edwards, died suddenly after having served the church for seven years. The church erected a monument to his memory in Harvard Grove Cemetery, and placed a marble tablet on the south wall of the sanctuary in recognition of his life and work.

With respect to gifts and properties, records show that the Memorial Windows were dedicated in 1901. In 1909 occurred the unveiling of the portrait of Thomas D. Jones, deacon 1858-1909. In 1912 the clock in the sanctuary was presented by J. H. Francis in memory of his mother. About the same time the offering plates were given by Mrs. Thomas D. Thomas in memory of her husband, Thomas D. Thomas. Later the choir platform was built by Benjamin Thomas. The church annex, adding two rooms to the building, was constructed in 1913 at a cost of \$1,825, during the pastorate of Dr. J. Vincent Jones, who was active in the project, contributing skill and strength. In 1937 the Glencoe Class gave the

Communion Set, and in 1939 the carpet. In 1941 Thomas D. Griffiths and Mrs. William Young gave the Pulpit Chairs in memory of their parents. In 1956 a group from the Frenn Class gave many work hours to the painting of the exterior of the building and much of the interior. This extensive renovation stirred normal pride among the members and lifted their interest and morale.

Before the turn of the century the church was fortunate to have a small pipe organ. Its operation required not only a pumper, but a superintendent of a corps of persons who could be secured and supervised to perform this service. The late Judge Blythin, later serving as church clerk, was superintendent of pumpers for a period. Near the close of 1928 a used Lyon & Healy Pipe Organ was secured for \$1,550. Early in 1958 the church purchased a completely renewed Baldwin Electronic Organ at a cost of \$2,409. In view of the bequest of the late T. B. Llewellyn, a devoted worker with young people earlier in the century, it was voted that the organ be dedicated to his memory.

Among the deacons who carried on during the first fifty years and into the second, three who served exceptional terms were Thomas D. Jones, 1858-1909, Richard Thomas, 1872-1925, and Jonadad Thomas, 1873-1923. During the past half century three others have established faithful and high records. Their names are William W. Jones, Evan L. Mathews, and Llewelyn Daniels, the latter having served since 1916.

Time would fail to tell of all who have served in the many organizations within the fellowship. Each has its particular place and honor. However, one should not overlook the Chairmen of the Board of Trustees, who have been stewards of the church's material interests. Since 1895 the names are Daniel D. Jones, J. F. Griffiths, W. E. Mathews, Alfred C. Jones, David Owen, Myron R. Lewis, Thomas H. Morgan, and Harold W. Maurer. These with their associates have given a good account of their stewardship. "Others have labored and we have entered into their labors."
